A survey of graduate Astronomy funding throughout Canadian universities

From one coast to the other, Canadian universities offer about 20 different graduate program in astronomy. Each of these institutions have their own tuition fees and funding rules. Most importantly, graduate astronomy programs are offered in cities with vastly different cost of living. Graduate students are, generally speaking, not member of a union when it comes to research (although they can be part of a union as teaching assistant). As such, they are not part of an organization that can help them know what is the situation like elsewhere for graduate students. Furthermore, relevant information tends to be lost quickly due to graduate students spending only a few years at the same place. This led to the present funding survey. Hopefully, it can bring present and future graduate students some relevant information.

The survey itself consists in funding information from 15 different institutions. Cost of living information was obtained from the website Numbeo crowd-sourcing database that include hundreds of entry for each city. References and details are included in the report.

The survey tries to be more comprehensive than previous ones by looking at major expenses for graduate students in each institutions. The categories of expenses included are:

- -Full-time domestic tuition*
- -Full-time ancillary fees*
- -Public transportation
- -Housing
- -Internet
- -Food
- -Leisure
- * Quoted tuition and ancillary fees are for full-time students at the start of their degree. Fee reduction can apply after a fixed number of tuition instalments or as the thesis is being written, depending on the institution. Reduced fees schedule and total degree tuition will be included when the data as been compiled.

A note on international tuition is included when available, but the situation varies between universities. A section is also dedicated to ancillary fees as they vary a lot. Public transportation is included with the tuition fees at most universities but does amount to 500-1000\$ a year when it isn't. For housing, a range is given for each city, the lowest value represents a person living outside of the city core with 2 roommates while the higher value represents someone living alone in the city core. Internet, food and leisure expenses are based on conservative numbers detailed in the survey. Three scenarios are then considered. Housing being the largest single expense, the scenarios are based on the minimum, maximum and average of the housing range. The average housing value obtained is generally in good agreement with what a person should expect to pay to live in the city core with 2 roommates or alone outside of the city core. A measure of the disposable income can then be obtained by combining various funding and expenses scenarios.

Although the first page of the report only summarizes the values for students with minimum funding in an average expenses scenario, more details are available for individual institutions. TA hours and salary included in minimum funding, how much a student can get for an additional TA position (and associated disposable income) and total NSERC funding (and associated disposable income) are given for most of the universities.

Getting a very complete picture of graduate funding is obviously very hard, especially when done on a voluntary basis like it is the case for this survey. The reader should keep in mind that there are limitations to the numbers obtained. For example, the distribution of funding compared to the minimum and the availability of scholarships (NSERC or others) are not included. Students also have to balance other things when deciding where to go, e.g.: research areas, excellence and reputation of the institution and the researchers, availability of supervisors, success of former students, etc.

It is of the opinion of the Graduate Student Committee that this survey should be kept updated and enhanced. It is also clear that the minimum funding situation of graduate astronomy students varies greatly throughout Canada. It should be kept in mind that, although the average funding may show a very different picture, a non-negligible fraction of graduate students have to live on minimum funding. Not having enough money to meet basic needs has been shown to be a huge source of stress. It also excludes individuals who may be capable of contributing in a meaningful way to research but who can't because they either can't afford it or are too stressed to do good work due to finances.

Étude sur le financement des programmes gradués en Astronomie dans les universités du Canada

Au total, les universités du Canada offrent environ 20 programmes gradués en astronomie. Chaque institution a différents frais de scolarité et différentes règles pour le financement des étudiants gradués. Plus important encore, les différents programmes sont offerts dans des villes pour lesquelles le coût de la vie varie grandement. Les étudiants gradués ne sont généralement pas membre d'un syndicat en ce qui concerne leurs travaux de recherche (bien qu'ils puissent être membre d'un syndicat due à leur tâche d'enseignement). Cela implique qu'ils ne sont pas membres d'une organisation qui peut les tenir informés de la situation d'autres étudiants gradués ailleurs. De plus, comme les étudiants gradués ne passent guère plus de quelques années au même endroit, l'information acquise tend à être perdue. La présente étude est le résultat de ce manque d'information.

L'étude elle-même comprend l'information sur le financement des étudiants gradués en astronomie de 15 institutions. Le coût de la vie pour chacune des villes universitaires est obtenu du site web Numbeo, une base de données remplie par le public comprenant des centaines de participants dans chaque ville. Les références et de plus amples détails sont inclus dans l'étude.

La présente étude tente d'être plus complète que celles qui ont précédées en regardant les détails des différentes dépenses des étudiants dans chacune des institution. Les catégories incluses sont:

- -Frais de scolarité temps-plein*
- -Frais afférents temps-plein*
- -Transport en commun
- -Logement
- -Internet
- -Nourriture
- -Loisirs

* Les frais inclus sont valides pour les étudiants à temps-plein débutant leur programme. Des réductions de frais peuvent s'appliquer après un nombre prédéterminé de paiements ou au moment de la rédaction de la thèse selon l'institution. Les frais réduis et les totaux des programmes seront inclus lorsque l'information aura été compilée.

Une note sur les frais de scolarité pour les étudiants internationaux est incluse lorsque disponible. Une section est dédiée aux frais afférents puisqu'ils varient beaucoup. Le transport en commun est inclus avec les frais de scolarité dans la plupart des universités mais s'élève tout de même à 500-1000\$ annuellement lorsque ce n'est pas le cas. Pour chaque ville, un interval est donné pour le coût de logement. La valeur minimale représente une personne vivant en dehors du centre-ville avec 2 colocataires alors que la valeur maximale correspond à une personne vivant seule au coeur de la ville. Les dépenses liées à l'internet, la nourriture et les loisirs sont basées sur un estimé conservateur détaillé dans l'étude. Trois scénarios sont considérés en combinant toutes les catégories. Comme le logement est la plus grande dépense, les scénarios sont basés sur les valeurs minimales, maximales et moyenne des coûts de logement. La valeur moyenne obtenue est généralement en bon accord avec le cas d'une personne vivant seule en dehors du coeur de la ville ou d'une personne vivant au coeur de la ville avec 2 colocataires. Une mesure du revenu disponible est ensuite obtenues en combinant revenus et dépenses.

Bien que la première page du rapport ne résume la situation que pour les étudiants vivant avec le salaire minimum garanti dans un scénario moyen de dépenses, plus de détails sont disponibles pour chaque institutions dans les pages suivantes. Nombre d'heures d'enseignement (et salaire inclus), combien une tâche additionnelle d'enseignement rapporte (et revenu disponible associé) et revenu avec une bourse du CRSNG (avec revenu disponible associé) sont détaillés pour la plupart des institutions.

Construire un portrait complet du financement des études gradués est très complexe, surtout lorsque fait sur une base volontaire comme dans le cas de la présente étude. Le lecteur doit garder à l'esprit les limitations de l'étude. Par exemple, la distribution des salaires autour du salaire minimum garanti et la disponibilité de bourses (CRSNG ou autres) ne sont pas inclus. Les étudiants doivent aussi inclure d'autres aspects lors du choix de l'université où ils entreprendrons un programme gradué comme: les sujets de recherche, l'excellence et la réputation de l'institution et des chercheurs, la disponibilité de superviseurs, le succès d'anciens étudiants, etc.

Il est de l'avis du Comité des Étudiants Gradués que cette étude devrait être tenue à jour et amélioré. Il est aussi clair que le financement minimum varie beaucoup à travers le Canada. Malgré que le financement moyen puisse donner une différente impression, une fraction importante des étudiants gradués doivent vivre avec le financement minimum. Ne pas avoir assez d'argent pour joindre les deux bouts peut être une grande source de stress. Cela à aussi pour effet d'exclure des étudiants qui pourrait être capable de contribuer à la recherche mais qui ne peuvent tout simplement pas se le permettre ou qui sont trop stressés par leur finances pour faire du bon travail.






MSc minimum funding




PhD minimum funding



MSc minimum funding after full-time tuition and ancillary fees




PhD minimum funding after full-time tuition and ancillary fees




MSc - TA hours included in minimum funding




PhD - TA hours included in minimum funding

Ancillary fees

Tuition fees are a big expense for students, but they don't represent the complete picture of university fees. Graduate students have to pay additional fees for administration, services and health and dental plans. Those fees are very important for students and they may well be unknown to supervisors and faculty members. The situation in Canada is somewhat bimodal. On one side, those fees account amount to an additional 15-25% of tuition fees in universities outside of the province of Québec (except at U of Alberta). That is, the "effective tuition fees" are 115-125% of the quoted tuition.


In Québec, the situation is very different. Tuition in Québec has been "frozen" for part of the last decades until 2007. From 2007 to 2012, tuition in Québec has risen at about twice the inflation rate until 2013 when it became indexed to the inflation (indexation is the most common situation in other Canadian provinces). Québec still has the lowest tuition fees in Canada. While tuition fees themselves were "frozen", Québec gave the universities the power to collect additional fees starting in 1986. They are known as "frais afférents" and include administrative fees and services. They are equivalent to the ancillary fees in other universities but, from when they were created up to at least 2007, they rose by more than 8% annually on average. This creates a somewhat distorted situation for tuition fees in Québec as, when afferent fees are combined with health and dental plan fees, they represent an amount equal to 40-70% of tuition fees. That is, the "effective tuition fees" are 140-170% of the quoted tuition.


